

Snap, Send, Solve

A valuable APP for smart-phones that cyclists will appreciate. As cyclists, we often come across damaged infrastructure, shopping trolleys in creeks, graffiti etc. that needs reporting to authorities. This APP allows for a photograph to be taken, report generated, along with location, and sent off to a relevant authority. A really neat aspect is that it has inbuilt, the address of the relevant authority. So, if a burnt out car is across a cycle path. A choice can be made of LGA, police or EPA.
